TUESDAYS OUGHT TO BE VIEWED AS LODGE NIGHT

wasn't permitted to fly a commercial airliner with passengers without a full crew. You all play an important role in our ultimate success. "So let's win one for the Gipper (the Lodge)".

Please try to make Tues. nights your Lodge Night. As officers we have accepted the responsibility to be at every Practice, Every Degree, Attend Every Officer School of Instruction, and other scheduled events. We are a team! We depend on each other to promote Masonry, to keep our lodge healthy and to carry out our responsibility as elected officers! 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Message from the Senior Warden

HELPING HAND

Brethren, as the year gets into high gear, we need to keep one eye ahead and one eye behind. This is especially true with our ritual as the officers will be attending the monthly Officer Schools of Instruction, or OSIs for short. It is true that the year is young and just beginning, but elections for the next Masonic year will be upon us before you know it.

To address this need, the Worshipful Master has been diligent since the beginning of the year to maximize the Lodge's time on Tuesdays by having mini practices. Practices have been held either before or after the scheduled business of the meeting with the intent of being as specific as possible. The results so far have been a general improvement in just the basic nuances specific to the ritual. That is good as we learn to not only slow some things down, but also to learn the cues necessary to make the work look more polished.

There is also a more important reason for making better practices. First, our degrees have the express purpose of carrying a message to a candidate. Secondly, a degree night belongs to the candidate and candidate alone, unless there are multiple candidates. When the ritual is performed not only technically correct, but with the love and care it deserves, that candidate or candidates get the message that they are the focal point of the evening. That makes it very special as they will then internalize the lessons taught which is the heart of what it means to be a Mason.

Also, practicing correctly to correctly execute the ritual assists candidates when being coached to return their proficiency because they are more likely to remember the impact the work had on them. Add to the fact that when they get to see the same degree from a sideline point of view, they too are following the ritual to test themselves on how well they have remembered the work.

The Gift of Gab(e)

A Tribute to **Brother Washington**

February 21st marks the 131st anniversary of the completion of the National treasure dedicated to the memory of Brother George Washington and the monument which bears his name. One would think that such a tribute to the leader of the Revolutionary War, first president, Father of his Country, patriot and outstanding Mason would be a "no brainer" to fund, manage and erect, but such, oddly, was not the case. It took nearly 40 years to erect the Washington Monument from the time the foundation was laid until it was opened to the public.

We view Washington as a hero and an icon of this country, but back in the 19th century, some members of Congress did not feel the same way. Remember that Washington was a member of the Federalist Party. Members of the Democratic-Republicans, a major party at the time, felt it was not right to honor those of a different political affiliation stating it was "unseemly and suspiciously Royalist".

Congress was, however, able to pass the proposal, but there was no smooth sailing ahead. There were ideological conflicts, lapses in funding and construction disruptions due to the Civil War. And what would it look like? Ideas ranged from statues and Greek columns to a marble tomb containing the former Commander in Chief. (The Washington family refused to allow the body to be removed from Mount Vernon.) So architect Robert Mills decided on a simple stone obelisk with a flat top. The pointed apex atop the monument we see today was added to the design in 1879. When Mills died in 1855, Colonel Thomas Casey Sr. and the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers were to continue construction of the monument and requests for quarried stones from around the world were sent to every allied county. The Colonel also requested that the Treasury Department pay his men not only in cash, but also in coffee. The Treasury Department obliged.

On the first day of construction, a zinc box containing many relics and curiosities of the time were buried including American coins, daguerreotypes of Washington and his family, various papers and media, maps, census data and books including a Bible. Memorial stones were donated from many countries and organizations to line the inside of the tower. Over 20,000 people showed up including then President James Polk, three future presidents (James Buchanan, Abraham Lincoln and Andrew Johnson), former First Lady Dolley Madison, and a bald eagle.

Construction ceased during the Civil War as all the nation's money had gone to the war effort. When construction was resumed, the newly quarried stones did not match those laid previously. A distinct color variation can still be seen today.

When completed in 1885, the monument was 555 feet tall and the tallest building in the world. That is until the Eiffel Tower was at 986 feet in 1886. Today, it is still the tallest all-stone structure and the tallest obelisk.

The Washington Monument has gone through many renovations over the years. As a result, every Grand Lodge in the United States, including the District of Columbia, have a memorial stone placed inside the structure. Hint: Look for the Grand Lodge of California as you ride up the elevator to the top of the structure.


